accounting has evolved primarily along an empirically driven path In the absence of models constructed specifically to explain this topic researchers have relied on economic intuition and theories from other disciplines mainly finance and economics as a basis for designing empirical analyses and interpreting findings Although this literature has shed important light on the usefulness of accounting information in capital markets it is obvious that the lack of a rigorous theoretical framework has hindered the establishment of a systematic and well structured literature and made it difficult to probe valuation issues in depth More recently however progress has been made on the theoretical front The two most prominent frameworks are it he linear information dynamic approach and ii the real options based approach which recognizes managerial uses of accounting information in the pursuit of value generation This volume devotes its initial chapters to an evaluation of the models using the linear dynamic approach and then provides a synthesis of the theoretical studies that adopt the real options approach and the empirical works which draw on them The book also makes an attempt to revisit and critique existing empirical research value relevance and earnings response studies within the real options based framework It is hoped that the book can heighten interest in integrating theoretical and empirical research in this field and play a role in helping this literature develop into a more structured and cohesive body of work Value is of ultimate concern to economic decision makers and valuation theory should serve as a platform for studying other accounting topics. The standard approach to infer the effects of causes in natural sciences and in psychology is to conduct randomized experiments In population studies experimental designs are generally infeasible In population studies most research is based on non experimental designs observational or survey designs and rarely on quasi experiments or natural experiments Using non experimental designs to infer causal relationships i e relationships that can ultimately inform policies or interventions is a complex undertaking Specifically treatment effects can be inferred from non experimental data with a counterfactual approach In this counterfactual perspective causal effects are defined as the difference between the potential outcome irrespective of whether or not an individual had received a certain treatment or experienced a certain cause The counterfactual approach to estimate effects of causes from quasi experimental data or from observational studies was first proposed by Rubin in 1974 and further developed by James Heckman and others This book presents both theoretical contributions and empirical applications of the counterfactual approach to causal inference Matched Samplina for Causal Effects Donald B.
